#### ACU Uni Step Up Program

The 2024 ACU Uni Step-Up Online program is about to begin, and the enrolment period is still open and available to all Year 11 students in regional/remote areas. Your school has had previous students participate in the Step-Up program and can provide a valuable insight for future students who may also wish to follow the same pathway.

Uni Step-Up Online is a free online program that gives student the opportunity to study First-Year Units outside of regular school hours and if successful, gain two University credits (applicable to other Universities) and an unconditional offer to an aligned ACU course. This program is ideal for students interested in Health, Business or Exercise Science fields and would like to take a first step towards achieving their career goals. The enrolment period closes on 22<sup>nd</sup> of February 2024, with the first Unit classes aiming to start in mid-March.

• Find out about what jobs match their abilities, interests and personality, and the subjects they need for those jobs.


As part of the program, your child will:

#### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR FAMILIES

#### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursion encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. Cards must be valid with Centrelink as of 19 January 2024. Students can be aged from 6 - 18 years old. If a student is the holder of a Youth Allowance type card in their own name that is valid, the parents are eligible to apply for the CSEF.

The annual amount per student will be \$250 for every secondary school student of eligible families. Payments will be made into the applicant's school account to use towards a child's expenses relating to camps, excursion or sporting activities.

REMINDER: ALL APPLICANTS ARE ASKED TO PROVIDE THE SCHOOL WITH A COPY OF THEIR CURRENT HEALTH CARE CARD.

How to apply: Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef. A copy of your Centrelink Concession Card will be taken when you return the completed form to school. Applications need to be made by Friday 22 March 2024, however the sooner you apply the sooner you will receive the funds into your account.

#### **CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE 2024**

A conveyance allowance may be paid to parents who drive their children more than 4.8km to the nearest pick up point of a free country bus service or their nearest school, where no bus service is available.

Families who currently claim a conveyance allowance with Stawell Secondary College DO need to lodge a new application.

Students who are attending Stawell Secondary College for the first time must meet the following guidelines. To be eligible for the Conveyance Allowance students must be:

1. Attending their nearest Government school.

2. Living further than 4.8km from either the school or the nearest pick up point of a free country bus.

Please contact the school office for an application form.

All eligible families must complete and return the form to the school by 29 February 2024.

#### <u>YEAR 7 UNIFORM PACK</u> (If you haven't already applied)

In 2024 every Year 7 government school student who was a recipient of CSEF in 2023 automatically qualifies to receive a uniform pack that is provided through State Schools' Relief. If your child was a CSEF recipient in 2023 and you are yet to apply for the package, you can apply for a CSEF Year 7 Uniform Pack by contacting Stawell Secondary College and completing the order form.


