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Principal's Communication 1 December 2023

This week I have been off site with the Great Victorian Bike Ride team. In my absence Courtney McIlvride has been Acting Principal. Zoe Jones has relocated to the Junior Hub to support the Junior School and Robyn Williams has provided Administration support.

The Year 7 – 11 2023 Presentation Afternoon last Friday has received extremely positive feedback from parents, students, and teachers. It was great to see so many parents attend and acknowledge the achievements of our students. Approximately 150 students were recognised for their outstanding achievements over 2023. The Presentation was enriched by the presence of former student, Dr Nic Pridan. Nic shared his educational aspirations from primary school to his final year of graduating as a doctor. It was also exciting to hear from Kayan Barnes who shared his amazing journey that culminated in competing in the National Final of the Legacy Public Speaking Competition in Adelaide.

Recent correspondence from the Victorian School Building Authority suggest that we may be closer to determining a tender and start time for our \$13 million building program. At this stage the VSBA Project Manager and CO-OP Studio Architects are hoping, but not too optimistic that we may know more before Christmas. They suggest we may see a start onsite early in February.

Parents and students are alerted to the important DET notification that our school is listed on the **BARR**. (Bushfire At-Risk Register). This means that our school is in an area that is most at risk of bushfire. When listed on the BARR, the school:

- is categorised based on its bushfire risk.
- must meet requirements for bushfire preparedness in the VRQA Guidelines
- may be required, based on its BARR category, to enact their pre-emptive action plan (being either their pre-emptive relocation, learning from home, or closure plan) on High or Extreme FDR days in their local government area (LGA)
- must close on days forecasted by the Bureau of Meteorology as Catastrophic FDR in their fire weather district and cancel any bus routes.

receives bushfire-specific compliance advice for their Shelter-in-Place building.

Please be reassured that our school is compliant with all the DET requirements, and the school community will be well informed should the need arise to specific actions to be required for the safety of our community.

The end of the year is fast approaching. Last week we farewelled our Year 11 students for 2023 and they commenced their summer break with subject tasks in preparation for Year 12 in 2024. This week the Year 10 students have moved down to the senior hub and experienced life as a Year 11. They too will commence their summer break at the end of this week. The remaining Year 7 to 9 students will continue their Learning journey with a mix of preparation for 2024 including relocating to new areas and lockers and undertaking classroom work to prepare them for next year. A reminder to all Year 7 to 9 students and parents that attendance at school is compulsory up to and including the 15th December 2023. The 18th and 19th of December are days for Parent/Student/Staff meeting at the request of parents with the 20th December a preparation day for 2024.

Students are encouraged to read the feedback provided after each unit of learning so that they can implement the recommended strategies to improve.


Library Competition—Guess The Number Of Lollies In The Jar
