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Principal's Communication 15 December 2023

The 2023 school year is fast coming to an end. With that in mind, all staff have been using their time productively preparing for 2024. While our general aim in 2024 is to continue to improve in all aspects of student learning and engagement, our specific focus will be:

- Learning Support both those who need extra support and those who have thrived to continue to extend their learning, especially in numeracy
- Wellbeing Effectively mobilise available resources to support students' wellbeing and mental health, especially the most vulnerable

These two "Key Improvement Strategies" have been the subject of Leadership and staff focus over the past year and planning is well underway to ensure the agreed actions are implemented. In addition, the new School Values, the School Wide Positive Behaviours, and our instructional Model will provide the foundation of our learning culture in the classroom and around the school community. Students, staff, and parents will all play a key role in embedding this culture into our everyday practice to ensure the students are given every opportunity to achieve their full potential.

The School Council held their last meeting for this year on Wednesday 22nd November with a Christmas dinner incorporated into the evening. The principal's report covered much of the highlights in recent weeks. Other discussions included the staffing progress for 2023 and the school review. The 2024 proposed budget was also presented and confirmed by the council with thanks to Marie McAloon for putting it together. I thanked the school council on behalf of our school community for their commitment and support over 2023.

In previous Connections I have kept the school community up to date with staff movement for 2023. While we are still processing a small number of staffing matters, we have established an impressive staffing team for 2024. In summary, we say farewell and thanks to the following staff who are moving on: Ebony Jennings, Casey Gray, Nick Oliver, Mat Teasdale, Donna Zhang, Kent Beveridge, Jen Barkley and Jordan Main with Zoe Jones taking maternity leave. We welcome our new staff; Dean Greenhalgh (Assistant Principal); Heidi Rees (Science); Tamika Joy (Health & Physical Education); Bai Lu (Chinese language assistant). We are looking forward to working with our new staff in 2024.

After another anxious wait our VCE results were well received by the students and staff with majority of the students communicating they were pleased with their results. The staff reflected on the study scores and were very pleased with how the students collectively went. Our English faculty had a statistically significant increase in the average Study Score showcasing the hard work put in by all staff and students. The Year 12 Presentation Evening on Thursday night highlighted our VCE Dux Tobie Ripper and VCAL Dux Joslyn Bibby. Congratulations to Tobie, Joslyn and all our Year 12 students for all they have achieved. I'm sure each student will pursue their future aspirations and be successful regardless of their results. We look forward to hearing their stories in the future.

As the curtain closes on another year, I extend my thanks to all the school community for your efforts and support, with a special mention to Emily Dalkin and the school council. A big thankyou to the Teaching staff and Education Support staff for their devotion to continuing to provide a positive learning environment for our students. STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM 2023 SUMMARY

We started the year off by giving all students at Stawell Secondary College the chance to self-nominate for a position on the team. We received 17 nominations. Initially we were thinking two members per year level but the school captains decided that we should have more than two representatives per year level (so as to not leave anyone out). There were five year 7 nominations, which is fantastic! The school captains then conducted a vote with all of the year 7's to determine who would get the positions.

Students also were asked to contribute to the School Wide Positive Behaviour S behaviour matrix, looking at our five school values of respect, resilience, aspiration, participation and inclusion and how these are displayed around the school.

On Monday 5th June three students from the team went to the Stawell Library for a youth meeting with people from Freeza and Stawell Neighbourhood House. In Term 2 the team ran a Go Pink Day on Tuesday 6th June. We sold pink ribbons for 50c on the day and it was a casual clothes day, where students and staff were encouraged to wear pink. The Student Leadership Team chose to have this day to support research into breast cancer. 209 ribbons were sold in total! A big thank you to Kayan Barnes, Addison Hutchins, Charmaine Lockwood and Amahli Sheen for selling these. The school raised \$338.55 for this cause.

On Thursday 14th September the Student Leadership Team plus friends participated in a discussion about the youth survey that the entire school was invited to complete earlier this year. This was called the NGSC Youth Strategy Workshop and was led by Marcy Britten who is the Community Health and Engagement Project Officer for the region. The results from the survey were reviewed, gaps were identified and ideas for areas for improvement were brainstormed. Mr Hart said that he would give us money for our cause. The team has provided Mr Hart and the staff Leadership Team with a proposal – more to come in 2024.

Finally, we are in the process of accepting nominations for the Student Leadership Team for 2024. Current members are able to re-nominate and some of the students have jumped at this opportunity. Kayla Membrey and Lewis Reading who are the School Captains for 2024, are automatically part of the team. To date, we have 6 new members who have self-nominated and 6 who have re-nominated for 2024.

As this was the first time the Student Leadership Team had operated at Stawell Secondary College we learnt a lot along the way and there will be some changes to the way the team operates in 2024. 
It was awesome to have all the 2024 Year 7 students together for the first time. The excitement continues to build for next year.


