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## Principal's Communication 8 March 2024

I would like to commence this week's communications with a big thank you to our school community for the understanding and support around our school closures as a result of the recent catastrophic fire danger days. Our community has been devastated from the Pomonal and Dadswell Bridge fires and many staff, students and families have been directly affected. While we are a resilient community, it will be a long road back for our families and friends to rebuild their lives. Our college joined with the other schools in the area to help raise money to support those in need. We raised money from our swimming carnival BBQ, casual dress day and zooper dooper sale last Friday. Our final tally of \$1660 has helped push the total for the All-School Appeal to over \$10.5 thousand, truly an outstanding effort. We thank our families, students, and staff for supporting the appeal.

Our external School Review has commenced with a Preparation meeting on Thursday 1st February. This was a planning meeting to establish the procedures and focus groups for the review. The review panel consists of Charmaine Taylor - Monash University School Review Group, School Council President - Emily Dalkin, SEIL - Therese Allen, Principal - Murray Hart, Assistant Principal - Dean Greenhalgh, Challenge Partners- Louise Amor (Assistant Principal Horsham Secondary College) and Tony Hand (Principal St Arnaud College). On Friday, 1st March, the review panel met on site to undertake the Validation Day. Validation Day involved reviewing our Pre-Review Self Evaluation from Term 3 & 4 in 2023. The panel also visited classrooms, interviewed student groups, and assessed our Professional Learning Community initiative via a presentation from Robyn Williams. The information gathered provided the panel with key focus questions and methodology for the remainder of the review. From here, external members of the panel have visited on the 7th & 8th March to interview more students, staff and parents as well as observe various aspects of the school to gather data to provide feedback to the school community. The final day on Thursday 14th March will be the presentation of the Review Panel report providing the school with a clear understanding of our current status and future improvement focus.

There has been over two months of no action from the Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) in relation to our \$12 million building program. Last week, I eventually was able to contact the Victorian Schools Building Authority and was able to get the latest update. The Scope Of Works has been reviewed and is almost ready to go to tender. The scope of works includes the construction of a new Administration building (without a staff common room), redevelopment of the current administration building into 6 classrooms, redevelopment of the Assembly Hall into a Resource Centre (Library) and Auditorium, refurbishment of the three art rooms, removal of the current Library, removal of the current Year 7 Hub and attached classrooms, removal of the Year 10 block (4 classrooms) and establishment of a cleaners room. Should the final tender price and associated cost be below the \$13.125 for the project, additional "Tender Options" may be included. These include a new driveway, staff room added to the Administration building, landscaping and decking entry to the new Resource Centre/Auditorium, large bi-fold doors for entry to the Auditorium, landscaping and decking around the new Administration building, landscaping within the centre hub of the school and landscaping along the Art wing. Unfortunately, I am not confident that the final costing will provide any Tender inclusion, which will be disappointing.

Unfortunately, it is extremely regretful that I need to inform you that there have been a number of isolated incidents of racism amongst our students and towards some of our teachers and community. This is most concerning and the school will follow up each incident and take appropriate action. While these incidents may be isolated, as with the community, we are experiencing an increase in teachers from different nationalities and the school will not tolerate any form of disrespect to staff, students or families, regardless of their heritage. Our school will continue to take the educational approach to racism but we cannot do it alone, and family support is vital in educating our students around this matter.

In the last edition of Connections I mentioned how pleasing it is that students and families have embraced the new uniform. A reminder to families that shoes are to be plain Black (no other colour). Please contact the school if you need support.

# Chinese Report

This year, the Chinese program at Stawell Secondary College will continue to offer a voluntary, after school hours **HSK Level 1** class to extend Year 7 and 8 students' language proficiency.

**HSK** (Hanyu Shuiping Kaoshi) or the Chinese Proficiency Test is an international, standardized exam which tests and rates Chinese language proficiency. It evaluates Chinese language abilities for non-native Chinese speakers in terms of using the Chinese language in their daily, academic and professional lives. The test is organised by Hanban (Chinese Language Council International).

In 2023, 11 students took the HSK Level 1 test and ALL achieved a Level 1 certificate! Our 2024, our HSK Level 1 class will be starting on Friday 15<sup>th</sup> March. Join us if you would like to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity! It is held each Friday after-school, so requires passion and commitment!







The past few weeks of HSK have included Chinese New Year celebrations, eating lots of delicious Chinese food and the start of our studying of HSK 2. We have learnt about directions and how to describe things in our HSK 2 content to extend our language skills! ## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR FAMILIES

#### **CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)**

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursion encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. Cards must be valid with Centrelink as of 19 January 2024. Students can be aged from 6 - 18 years old. If a student is the holder of a Youth Allowance type card in their own name that is valid, the parents are eligible to apply for the CSEF.

The annual amount per student will be \$250 for every secondary school student of eligible families. Payments will be made into the applicant's school account to use towards a child's expenses relating to camps, excursion or sporting activities.

REMINDER: ALL APPLICANTS ARE ASKED TO PROVIDE THE SCHOOL WITH A COPY OF THEIR CURRENT HEALTH CARE CARD.

How to apply: Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef. A copy of your Centrelink Concession Card will be taken when you return the completed form to school. Applications need to be made by Friday 22 March 2024, however the sooner you apply the sooner you will receive the funds into your account.
