We then went to Chef Cat Clarkes private restaurant in Dimboola to explore her garden, pick ingredients to make lemon myrtle chicken wraps with wilted warragal greens, baked spuds with sour cream and bush dukkha and muntrie and river mint pancakes. The students had fun mixing and cooking before enjoying the lovely meal.



Disability Inclusion is a new approach for students with physical, learning, and behavioural disability in our school. This program is a government initiative that provides extra support for students with disability in all Victorian Government schools. Disability Inclusion introduces a tiered funding model for students with disability with additional funding for schools to help students with disability take part in their education on the same basis as their peers. Currently our school is being briefed on the program and preparing for our launch in 2025.

Chinese Culture Activity

The "Fitness Dragon," also known as the Ribbon Dragon, consists of a dragon head, a dragon body, and a dragon tail. The dragon body is typically made of 3-10 meters of silk fabric. Unlike the traditional dance dragon, the "Fitness Dragon" has a shorter dragon head, which is tied with a rope and can be easily managed while dancing with the leash. It is a trendy new fitness activity loved by Chinese people, typically practiced in parks and open spaces within their apartment complexes.
