





As we welcome back students to Term 3, we would like to remind students and families of the College Uniform. It is expected that all students follow the College expectations and wear the correct uniform to school. Students that are not in correct uniform will need a note provided, which the coordinators will follow up with. Please refer to the Uniform information below.

Bike Safety

We wanted to remind students and families around the safety requirements when riding a bike or scooter to school.

Helmets

All Students – whether they are riding a bike or are a passenger – must wear a properly fitting and fastened helmet that meets Australian safety standard AS/NZS2063.

Where to ride

Children can ride on the road, but it may be safer for them to ride on the footpath. Children 12 years or under can ride on footpaths, bike paths, shared paths, and separated footpaths. If you are 13 years or older and you are accompanying a child 12 years or under you can ride with them on a footpath.

Scooter Safety

Helmets

All children – whether they are riding a bike or are a passenger – must wear a properly fitting and fastened helmet that meets Australian safety standard AS/NZS2063.

Where to ride

Scooters can be used on, footpaths, bicycle paths, shared paths, the bicycle side of separated paths, shared zones some low-speed roads. When travelling on a road users must keep as far to the left side of the road as is practicable.


Year 11 Psychology

The Library Of Borrowed Hearts Author: Lucy Gilmore

Unable to resist following the clues left behind, Chloe is delighted to realise this isn't the only old book filled with romantic marginalia. But as she falls deeper into a breathless literary scavenger hunt, she's only left with questions: What happened to the tragic lovers who corresponded in the margins? And what does it have to do with the sad old man next door, who only now has begun to open his home and heart to Chloe and her siblings?
