Bike Safety

We wanted to remind students and families around the safety requirements when riding a bike or scooter to school.

Helmets

All Students – whether they are riding a bike or are a passenger – must wear a properly fitting and fastened helmet that meets Australian safety standard AS/NZS2063.

Where to ride

Children can ride on the road, but it may be safer for them to ride on the footpath. Children 12 years or under can ride on footpaths, bike paths, shared paths, and separated footpaths. If you are 13 years or older and you are accompanying a child 12 years or under you can ride with them on a footpath.

Scooter Safety

<u>Helmets</u>

All children – whether they are riding a bike or are a passenger – must wear a properly fitting and fastened helmet that meets Australian safety standard AS/NZS2063.

Where to ride

Scooters can be used on, footpaths, bicycle paths, shared paths, the bicycle side of separated paths, shared zones some low-speed roads. When travelling on a road users must keep as far to the left side of the road as is practicable.











YEAR 8 MATHS

The Year 8s have been completing a data investigation, collecting data from the Olympics and studying it to determine the mean, median, mode and range. This week, students investigated what makes a country wealthy and ranked countries based on their wealth. Then, students picked an event and found the top 10 scores for both females and males, calculating the averages and determining how consistent the performances are. Some students have shown aspiration by learning Year 9 and 10 skills such as Interquartile Range and Standard Deviation which has been absolutely amazing!

YEAR 12 PSYCHOLOGY STUDENT RECALL EXPERIMENT

How many things can YOU remember at once?

During week three and four, Year 12 Psychology students conducted a school-wide student recall experiment testing short term memory. Nearly all classes and students were able to participate.

Classes were shown an image displaying 12 items for one minute. The image of 12 items was removed for 20 seconds (the time when short term memory starts to fade) after which time students were instructed to write what they recalled seeing.

Twelve was deliberately chosen as the number of items as it exceeds the number of things most people can remember at one time. It's usually between five to nine, unless a mnemonic strategy is used.

Some mnemonic strategies include chunking (breaking information into categories e.g. fruit, colours, pantry, reading etc) acronyms (making a word or non-sense word from the first letters e.g. LABB COP MMMMM) and acrostics (making a sentence from the first letters e.g. My toddler Ben often likes a pretty big, mighty, magnificent milk milo).

These strategies can reduce the number of items to be remembered, make information more memorable and act as a prompt. Beneficial for everyday life and in studying for tests. Given the time constraint in this case, chunking would probably be the most efficient.

Classes were subject to either 'Condition 1' or 'Condition 2'. Condition 1 students were educated on mnemonic devices after the experiment, and Condition 2 students were educated before the experiment. Data is being compared between the two conditions. The results so far show that 'Condition 2' students are scoring more items recalled than Condition 1 students, as was predicted.

The Year 12s are currently analysing the data and will be constructing a scientific poster to complete their SAC.

YEAR 10 ARY



Supervision arrangements before and after school

Student safety at Stawell Secondary College is our highest priority. The safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: School grounds are supervised from 8.40am each morning.

After school: School grounds are supervised until 3.40pm each afternoon, including the rural bus exchange.

Students on school grounds outside these times will **not** be supervised (unless they are attending an approved before or after school program or supervised extracurricular activity).

Parents/carers are requested to ensure that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times.

YEAR 11 BIOLOGY

The Year 11 Biology class of Mrs. Bernardo did the staining and squashing procedures in the growing root tip of onion and garlic cells to observe the characteristic changes in the chromosomes at different stages of mitosis (prophase, metaphase, anaphase and telophase) at 100x and 400x magnification. The root rips were preserved in acetic ethanol fixative, treated with acid and heat to break up the cellulose wall and squash the tissue on the microscopic slide. The aceto-orcein stain was used to turn the chromosomes into purple red colour.





On Monday 22nd July our Marrung students were invited to join Stawell West Primary School for Naidoc Celebrations with Uncle Ron Marks.

Our students showed great leadership skills helping the students with the activities and ensuring all students were involved. Keeping them safe around the fires, assisting with making the damper dough and cleaning up afterwards.

The students gathered firewood, sticks etc to build fires for cooking, helped make johnny cakes, damper and assisted Uncle Ron in cooking the crocodile and kangaroo. They all enjoyed eating the delicious food.












Naidoc Display


