# Food Technology Year 10 - Independent Living

Year 10 Food Technology—Independent Living students have just finished the assessment task related to 'Hosting a Dinner Party'

Students followed a design brief which required them to create a menu for 6 guests, for under \$50. They had to come up with a theme and create a two-course meal that required them to buy everything they needed as if they were setting up a new unit, with no existing pantry items. Students had to look at ways to save money when purchasing their ingredients.

Students selected a range of themes from colours e.g. blue, pink, black, countries such as Mexico, China, Italy to Star Wars, Rock and Roll etc. A big thank you to Tanya, who went above and beyond purchasing everything to make 25+ different meals.









































## Year 11 Biology

The Year 11 Biology class of Mrs. Bernardo has experienced cloning a cauliflower through the application of plant tissue culture techniques. Micro florets of cauliflower were taken and grown in a controlled sterile environment on a nutrient culture medium (Murashige and Skoog), where temperature, lighting, and hormone and nutrient availability are all closely regulated. This is the first time that a tissue culture practical investigation has being conducted at the school, and we hope to obtain desirable results in two weeks.

### COMPETITION RESULTS




We acknowledge and congratulate seven students who displayed our core values of aspiration, resilience and participation by competing in the annual Australian Mathematics Competition.

Riley Hope (Year 7) received a Participation certificate, Lylah Slorach (Year 7), Kayan Barnes and Declan Seaman (Year 9) all received a Certificate of Proficiency and three Year 9 students: Brody Johnson, Scott Tulloch and Aryan Judge all received certificates of Credit.

Year 9 students are currently studying the film The Truman Show. This 1998 film directed by Peter Weir explores a number of themes that our students have been investigating in second semester. We began Term 3 by studying the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and some of the terrible breaches of human rights that have occurred in this and the last century. We went on to study the Civil Rights movement, particularly in the USA, focussing on Dr Martin Luther King Jr in the film Selma. Our current film study is a more light-hearted approach to the question of freedoms, slavery, privacy and our rights to choice. It has encouraged a lot of discussion and occasionally, disagreement amongst students. We have had some serious debates over the ethics of filming and broadcasting someone's activities without them knowing. Some students have agreed that they could appear in 'The Truman Show' as supporting cast, others have said they could not, because they could not lie to Truman. Year 9 English is bubbling with ethical questions at the moment.




#### **Acknowledgement of Country**
