• Retrieval Practice: Use a mini whiteboard or a Hanzi writing book to reinforce new words and expressions weekly













• Make Associations When Writing Hanzi: Visualize the characters or create a mini story to enhance memory.

Sample of student work: Can you find Blake Hyslop's Chinese book and find the Hanzi analysis parts and take some photos.










• Use Visual Cues: Incorporate visual aids to create sentences, stories or memorize texts.

Remember: Practice makes perfect!











VCE Study Tips

2. Study Skills



Time Management & Organization

- Use your study diary to track assessments and deadlines.
- Create a study timetable.
- Set daily and weekly study goals in your student diary.
- Prioritize tasks.

Effective Study Techniques

- Use active recall (e.g., flashcards, self-quizzing) instead of passive reading.
- Summarize key concepts in your own words.
- Apply your knowledge by teaching someone else.

Year 7 Camp



From 3rd March to 5th March, our Year 7 students embarked on an exciting adventure to Halls Gap, staying at the picturesque Silverband Lodge. From the moment they stepped off the bus, students were immersed in a series of exhilarating activities designed to challenge and unite them. Our Year 7 students truly embodied the school values throughout the trip. They aspired to be the best versions of themselves, bravely participating in activities that pushed them outside their comfort zones. Whether it was conquering fears during abseiling or taking the "giant leap of faith" in the high ropes course, each student demonstrated remarkable resilience and determination. A highlight of the camp was the inclusion shown. Students rallied around one another, encouraging each other to face fears and overcome obstacles. It was heartwarming to witness acts of kindness and respect, as they cheered for friends taking on challenges and offered a helping hand to those needing support.

Throughout the camp, students engaged in a variety of activities that not only tested their physical abilities but also stimulated their minds. During abseiling, students felt their "Spidey senses" tingle as they descended the rocky cliffs, learning to trust themselves and their safety gear. Xander Bowen described the experience, stating, "We then started a little hike up a rock to do our abseiling, which was roughly 15 meters. After we arrived at the top, some people got a bit freaked out but others were eager to go down the rock and have some fun." The high ropes course featured a thrilling "giant leap of faith," where participants had to rely on their balance and courage, pushing past personal limits. From the Chautauqua Peaks, students shared awe-inspiring views and bonded over the shared experience of adventure. The hike through the stunning landscape became a memorable highlight for many. Jamie Simpkin described the experience, noting, "For the first half of the hike, we were in the shade of the mountain, and it was pretty fun. We crossed a river on the way there, and it was so clear that you could see plants at the bottom. There were lots of wallabies, and one was so close to the path that Bradley almost stepped on it! Then we got to the other side of the mountain and out of the shadows, and the sun was really hot. We kept going up the mountain, and eventually, we got to the top. The view was breathtaking and totally worth it." Sailing on Lake Bellfield allowed them to collaborate as they navigated the challenges of teamwork and communication while getting a chance to cool off from the heat. The students had a blast making and ultimately sinking their rafts.

In addition to physical challenges, students tackled lateral thinking puzzles designed to emphasise the importance of communication, listening, and teamwork. These engaging tasks encouraged students to embrace challenges, showcasing their problem-solving skills, creativity, and, most importantly, their resilience when faced with setbacks. Notably, these challenges provided a platform for new leaders to emerge within the class. Haylei Mitchell, in particular, stood out as she guided her group through a task they had struggled with repeatedly, demonstrating her ability to inspire and motivate her peers. The design of these challenges allowed for opportunities to fail and learn, reinforcing the idea that perseverance is key to success.

The most significant takeaway from the Year 7 camp was the chance for students to forge new friendships and strengthen existing ones. Facing fears and conquering challenges together created lasting memories and a strong sense of community. We returned with not only tales of adventure but also a deeper understanding of each other. Entry is free to all students.


Students may submit up to 2 entries per day.
