

I grew up in horse racing, as both of my parents are former jockeys and now train horses.

The apprentice jockey training program is extremely competitive and difficult to get into. To even be considered, applicants must complete a year-long pre-program. Out of the entire state, only 12 people were accepted. The selection process involved numerous physical and mental tests, along with extensive paperwork.

As part of the program, I attend monthly training sessions at Flemington Racecourse to develop my skills and continue learning. I am working towards progressing to race riding in the next few months.

Playing in the Under-16 Cricket Australia National Championships for Vic Country was an incredible experience. Coming from playing Premier Cricket in Geelong and Melbourne each week, stepping up to face the best Under-16 girls in the country from January 6-13 in Ballarat was both exciting and challenging.

Our team finished second in the group stage, winning five out of seven games, before falling to Vic Metro in the third-place play-off. I opened the bowling and took three wickets, with my best figures being 1/18 from six overs against NSW Metro. The T20 matches were particularly tough, as batters attacked from the start, whereas the one-dayers allowed for a more strategic approach. By the final day, we were feeling the fatigue, which affected our performance.

The journey to Nationals began back in July 2024, with the Emerging Players Program selecting the Top 30 Under-16 girls in Victoria. After months of training and trial games, I was thrilled to make the final squad. Now, my focus shifts back to club cricket with Geelong, where we are pushing for finals in the Victorian Premier Cricket Women's Second Grade. There's still plenty of cricket ahead!

On 23rd February, I had my first West Vic Fed Uni Golf Academy training session at Buninyong.



Only 10 people were accepted into the academy, and we learned a lot about our own golf styles as well as golf in general.

The Academy includes many high-performance sessions, in-depth swing analysis, multiple training sessions, strength and conditioning, nutrition, sports psychology, and much more.

Students who love dance can practice Chinese fan dancing every Thursday in E4 (Chinese Room). There will be numerous performance opportunities in the wider school community.

SCHOOL SAVINBG BONUS

Have you accessed your \$400 School Saving Bonus for each child?

This once only support for families is very easy to use. This is your opportunity to purchase uniform items from Fosters Mensland or school books from Campion at no cost to you. Please do not hesitate to contact Marie McAloon, Business Manager, if you need any information or assistance.

Funds that have not been spent by 30 June will revert to your family account to be used for your child's camps or excursion. The opportunity to use the \$400 for uniform or book lists ends 30 June 2025. Funds will rollover for use in future years if not all spent in 2025.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss the opportunity to join their peers for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursion encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. Cards must be valid with Centrelink as of 19 January 2024. Students can be aged from 6 – 18 years old. If a student is the holder of a Youth Allowance type card in their own name that is valid, the parents are eligible to apply for the CSEF.

The annual amount per student will be \$250 for every secondary school student of eligible families. Payments will be made into the applicant's school account to use towards a child's expenses relating to camps, excursion or sporting activities.

REMINDER: ALL APPLICANTS ARE ASKED TO PROVIDE THE SCHOOL WITH A COPY OF THEIR CURRENT HEALTH CARE CARD.

How to apply: Contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef. A copy of your Centrelink Concession Card will be taken when you return the completed form to school. Applications need to be made by **Friday 21 March 2025**, however the sooner you apply the sooner you will receive the funds into your account.

CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE 2025

A conveyance allowance may be paid to parents who drive their children more than 4.8km to the nearest pick up point of a free country bus service or their nearest school, where no bus service is available.

All Families need to lodge a new application.

Students who are attending Stawell Secondary College for the first time must meet the following guidelines. To be eligible for the Conveyance Allowance students must be:

- 1. Attending their nearest Government school.
- 2. Living further than 4.8km from either the school or the nearest pick up point of a free country bus.

Please contact the school office for an application form.

All eligible families must complete and return the form to the school by 28 February 2025.

YEAR 7 UNIFORM PACK (If you haven't already applied)

In 2025 every Year 7 government school student who was a recipient of CSEF in 2024 automatically qualifies to receive a uniform pack that is provided through State Schools' Relief. If your child is eligible and you are yet to apply for the package, you can apply for a CSEF Year 7 Uniform Pack by contacting Stawell Secondary College and completing the order form. We also ask that you arrange to have your child's foot measured at the school office.

You will receive a \$85 voucher for Foster's Mensland and a pair of school shoes.




The House Of Rural Realness Author: Curtis Campbell
