Strong Mob excursion to Halls Gap June 2025

Our Year 7-12 First Nations students joined other secondary schools in the area for a connection to culture at the Gathering Place Budja Budja in Halls Gap.

The days were dedicated to fostering strong cultural connections with one another in our own backyard in the Grampians, showing school values and participating within small group activities, forming lasting connections and friendships with others.

Students learnt from Jess Chatfield, a Gunditjmara woman, who passed on her own stories, knowledge of local plants in the bush tucker garden and the significance of coming together, making new friendships and strong connections to the land around us.

Jess is passionate about connecting through art and passed on her knowledge of indigenous symbols their significance, enriching their understanding and expression through art.

Throughout the experience students were able to explore the meaning of various indigenous symbols and their significance, expressing their own connections through art.

During the two days students had the opportunity to share their own journey taken so far, creating their own stories on totem poles that reflect who they are and what connects them to the land and culture. Making message stones to pass onto others, walking through the beautiful landscape and connecting to the land around us while enjoying the company of some local friendly wildlife, Kangaroos and Kookaburras.

On the last day of the cultural experience, we had a special guest join us to show the students how to create some street art using stencils. Students had the opportunity to listen and learn from Adrian Doyle from Blender Studios in Melbourne and create their own piece.

At the end of each day students enjoyed sitting around the firepit and making damper and reflecting on the day's experiences, deepening the bonds formed.

What's new in the AG VIEW

Week 9 – Students made a valuable contribution by completing the initial stages of fencing on the back oval near the bushland reserve. The session began with learning how to tie a figure-eight knot, followed by a site inspection to determine the most suitable approach using the available materials. We were fortunate to repurpose old, tangled wire, which students successfully untangled and used to complete three lines of fencing, with all the wire that we had. They demonstrated strong teamwork by feeding the single wire through the posts, rotating roles to ensure everyone understood each part of the process. Moving forward, we plan to use a wire spool to streamline the task and improve efficiency.





Week 10 - Students ventured out to Ms Lang's farm to check on the progress of the crops after the recent rains. It was great to see everything green, and the crops have progressed further again. Our crop plot had an extra 8mm overnight prior to us coming out to visit and we were able to see the changes from the last fortnight of checking the progress. Unfortunately, we did not sow the beans deep enough and the cockies had eaten most of them.

We were lucky to have more rain whilst we were out on the farm and see lots of wildlife out and about.

We washed the bus down and discussed the importance of biosecurity (will be a unit in 2026) and avoiding the movement of weeds etc.













YEAR 12 PSYCHOLOGY


Have you ever wondered about the following:

- Is audio or visual better for recalling a list of words?
- Can chunking effect working memory and recall and improve memory?
- Does sugar and caffeine intake influence memory?
- Will positive reinforcement encourage behaviour more than punishment?
- Does having a full stomach effect memory?
- Do people remember more at the beginning and end of a list than in the middle?
- Will people be influenced by others through observational learning?
- Is recall or recognition a better way to remember?

For their SAC the Year 12 Psychology class were to create and conduct an experiment on a topic covered in unit 3 being: the nervous system, stress, learning and memory. In pairs students conducted their experiments with students in Years 10 - 12. They are now going to write up their results in a poster for assessment. Students had to be over the age of 16 to be able to give written permission.

A big thank you to the following classes and teachers for allowing the Year 12 Psychology class to come into their classes to conduct these experiments: Year 10 Maths (Ms Mac), Year 10 English (Mrs Giles), Year 11 VM (Wes), Year 12 VM (Mrs McDonald), Year 11 Legal Studies (Miss Tangey), Year 11 Physics (Mr Adetayo), Year 11 and 12 Chinese (Ms Ling) and students in study. Without the participation of these classes we would not have been able to collect the data needed for this SAC.


Fosters Mensland will have the pants available from the start of next term at approximately \$65.95.

Good Luck and Other Lies Author: Catriona McKeown
