## Year 7 English

In Year 7 English students have begun reading the novel 'Holes' by Louis Sachar. They have been analysing the novel's context, themes and characters by completing a variety of activities such as: comprehension questions, vocabulary work, researching the author and constructing a timeline. They will then plan a TEEL essay using evidence from the text to support their arguments. Students will be assessed on their participation in class discussions and activities, as well as their submission of the final task.





### Year 8 English

Students have been exploring the concepts of self, belonging and connection to country through poetry, song and other forms of writing from First Nations Peoples, immigrants and other Australians. Students will then choose one of the First Nations texts that they connect with and will write a report about the author/creator of the piece and will present this to the class along with their response to the text.

# What is involved in the subject English?

English the subject, is the study of reading, viewing, writing, speaking and listening. This is broken down further into language, literature and literacy. In Secondary School, students will build on the basics learnt in Primary School by expanding their vocabulary, deepening their understanding about grammar and punctuation and becoming confident, independent and critical thinkers. Students learn how language enables people to interact effectively, to build and maintain relationships and to express and exchange knowledge, skills, attitudes, feelings and opinions. A variety of texts are studied from Year 7 through to Year 12 which enables students to see the world from different perspectives and to analyse character and plot development. Texts take the form of novels, graphic novels, films, newspaper articles, poetry, short stories and many more. As students progress to senior secondary the texts studied become more complex, with more mature themes and intricate characters. The writing expected from students is more advanced, often drawing on their own life experiences. At Stawell Secondary College students are assessed on one formal speech each year and they are given multiple opportunities to speak throughout English classes. Students are given opportunities to read each lesson and to write a variety of different pieces of writing, considering audience, purpose, form and context. The English teachers at Stawell Secondary College are all passionate about the subject and we attempt to instill in our students a love of reading and writing.
