
Your opinions are important to us and will contribute to identifying areas for improvement and professional development needs in the school, to target school planning and improve outcomes for students.

Regional Track and Field Athletics

Last Thursday, six students headed to Ballarat to represent Stawell Secondary College at the Regional Track and Field Athletics. All students were successful in their specialty areas. Billy Williams achieved a third-place position for the 1500m run, and Austin Tyres second place for Shot put. Jordan Lockwood, Rhenz Enriquez, Dusty Wethers, and Xyrus Gragasin ran third-place in the relay. In addition to the boys' relay race, Xyrus Gragasin also went on to qualify third in both the 100m and 200m races, and first-place for both the Tripple-jump and Long-jump events, qualifying him for the State Athletics in both those events. Xyrus' Tripple-jump recorded an impressive 11.2 meters and the Long jump, 5.9 meters smashing a Regional Athletic record held since 1982. Congratulations to all out successful athletes and best of luck to Xyrus in the next round in Melbourne.



Year 7 English











In Year 7 the students study a variety of different forms of literature allowing them to explore themes and ideas that they will encounter at school, home and in the wider community. Our aim is to build students' confidence in becoming effective and skilled communicators, both written and verbally. The topics covered include: autobiographies, biographies, the narrative plot structure, speeches, advertising (purpose, history, analysing and creating), persuasive writing, letter writing, creative writing, short stories and text study. The two main texts used are Boy by Roald Dahl and Holes by Louis Sachar. Silent reading of a text of students' own choice is a main focus too. A weekly grammar, punctuation and vocabulary program called English Rules is utilised as well.

Following the success of last year's trip, 25 students and four staff from Stawell Secondary College recently completed a 15-day study tour across Shanghai, Beijing, and Xi'an. The journey offered students a rich mix of language learning, cultural experiences, and global exploration.

In **Shangha**i, students visited the Yu Garden, the Oriental Pearl Tower, and enjoyed a night cruise along the Bund before spending an exciting day at Disneyland. They then travelled to **Beijing** by bullet train, where they attended classes at Beijing Language and Culture University, learning Chinese conversation, Kung Fu, and traditional dragon dancing. Highlights included climbing the Great Wall, visiting the Forbidden City and Summer Palace, and joining locals for morning exercises at the Temple of Heaven. The final stop was **Xi'an**, home to the Terracotta Warriors and the ancient city wall.

Study Tips

- 1. Plan your time: Create a realistic study schedule and stick to it.
- 2. Prioritise weak areas: Focus on topics you find most challenging first.
- 3. Practise past exams: Simulate real exam conditions to build confidence.
- 4. Use active recall: Test yourself regularly instead of just rereading notes.
- 5. **Take short breaks:** Study in 40–50 minute blocks with 5–10 minute breaks.
- 6. **Stay organised:** Keep notes, summaries, and materials neat and accessible.
- 7. **Stay healthy:** Get enough sleep, eat well, and stay hydrated.
- 8. Ask for help: Reach out to teachers if you're unsure about any topic.
- 9. **Stay positive:** Believe in yourself you've got this!

Year 11 Physics

EGG-CELLENT DESIGN: Protecting an Egg from a 6m Fall Using Physics

Explore the fascinating application of physics as Year 11 Physics students design structures to protect eggs from breaking when dropped from 6 meters.




The key physics concepts applied by the students to protect the eggs were:

<u>Impulse and momentum:</u> Increasing the time of impact to reduce the force on the egg.

<u>Energy absorption:</u> Designing materials and structures to absorb and dissipate energy, reducing the impact on the egg.

In real-world applications, these principles help us understand safety features like seatbelts, airbags where structures slow down an object's descent and reduce impact force. This principle is also crucial for protecting fragile objects during transportation and developing safety features for consumer products.

The designs yielded impressive results, with eggs surviving the 6-meter drop without breaking.



As part of their study on artificial reproductive cloning, Year 11 Biology students have performed cauliflower cloning using aseptic techniques. They have sterilised cauliflower florets in SDICN solution and transferred them onto Murashige and Skoog medium supplemented with kinetin under sterile conditions. The explants have been incubated in controlled environments to promote callus formation and potential plant regeneration. Students will be recording their observations over the next 2–3 weeks to monitor growth and developmental changes.

What's new in the AG VIEW

During Week One, students had one final look at their crop plots that were planted back in May. Many crops showed excellent growth, although large sections were unfortunately overtaken by capeweed. During this excursion, we also visited several woolsheds, including Glendemar's Ram Sale. Students observed the setup of the sale, viewing the pens and layout, and had the opportunity to see the rams up close in the side shed. We then visited three additional woolsheds in the area, with two actively shearing during our visit — a great chance for students to see the process in action. On our way back, we witnessed silage being made and watched hay bales being wrapped in plastic to preserve moisture for use over the next 12 months.

In Week Two, our class travelled to Rupanyup — to meet Tristan from Ag-Xtra. There, students observed the crop selection site for the upcoming school competition, scheduled for October 29th at the same location. Tristan explained the different growth stages of various wheat varieties and how rainfall and regional conditions impact their success. The girls' team's crop variety, for example, typically performs better in areas further south where rainfall is higher than in the Wimmera.















Later that day, students returned to Glendemar's woolshed in Kanya to witness Nikki Lyons' world record attempt — aiming to become the first female shearer to complete nine hours of shearing. Nikki worked in five runs, and students had the chance to watch her during her third. It was inspiring to see everyone cheer her on and admire her strength, determination, and endurance. ABC Country Hour's Warwick Long and Angus Verley were present, and our very own Emily Grant bravely spoke live on air with minimal notice — well done, Emily! Nikki went on to shear 502 sheep in nine hours, securing her place in the world record books. What an incredible achievement, and how fortunate we were to witness it firsthand!




Stawell Gold Mine Excursion – 27th October
